



The Leslie Gulch Tuff (consolidated volcanic ash), which makes



up the bulk of these formations, is a rhyolite ash that erupted from the Mahogany Mountain caldera in a series of violent explosions about 15.5 million years ago. The towers of volcanic ash have been eroded and are similar to the landscape seen in the Grand Canyon. Watch for the California bighorn sheep that have been re-introduced into the area. May Gem of the Month: Beryl

Beryl is often unknown to the general public, even the gemstone-buying public. However, it is one of the most important gem minerals. Beryl in pure form is colorless, called Goshanite. It is the many different impurities that give beryl its varied coloration. Without these splendid color varieties, beryl would be a rather ordinary gemstone with only average fire and brilliance.

The green variety, Emerald, is one of the most precious gems. The color is usually caused by the element chromium. Only green Beryl with a deep green color is called Emerald; light green Beryl is simply "Green_Beryl".

Aquamarine, another important gemstone, is the greenish-blue to blue variety of Beryl. Its color is usually caused by iron. Green Beryl from certain localities can be heat_treated to produce sky-blue Aquamarine. Other popular gem varieties of Beryl are the pink Morganite, and the yellow Heliodor and Golden_Beryl. A deep red variety of Beryl, known as Red_Beryl (or Bixbite) is extremely rare, and only comes from two localities in Utah. When in good specimens, Red Beryl commands an outstanding premium and is very difficult to obtain.

CHARACTERISTICS:

- Color is varied and includes emerald green, blue to bluegreen,
 - yellow, greenish-gold, red, colorless and pink.
- **Luster** is vitreous.
- **Transparency:** Crystals are transparent to translucent.
- Crystal System is hexagonal; 6/m 2/m 2/m
- **Crystal Habits** typically include the hexagonal prism with pincoid terminations. The terminations are often modified by many different pyramidal faces which can sometimes produce a rounded termination in the rough shape of a used pencil eraser.
- **Cleavage** is imperfect in one direction (basal).
- **Fracture** is conchoidal.
- **Hardness** is **7.5 8.**

 Notable Occurrences include Colombia and some African localities for emerald; Brazil, Russia and Pakistan for aquamarine; California, Brazil, Africa, and many other localities for other beryls.


